LIBRARY NETWORKING AND COOPERATION Some theological library associations in the region

1) Joint Library Committee (JLC), Bangalore

The Joint Library Committee (JLC), an association of librarians from Bangalore Theological Institutions, was established in the year 1984. Membership has grown over the years and we now have seventeen active members from within and around Bangalore city. The formation of JLC has proved that we are one in Christ with one mission to accomplish, that is, to serve God by serving others. Once in four months, members meet in a different institution to have fellowship, discuss various issues related to the association, and plan for projects that would enhance cooperation in the association. Various scholars and experts are invited to guide us in our progress through presenting papers and other forms of training. People from the various institutions enjoy the fellowship and working towards a common goal. As per the Constitution, a regular member institution can borrow five books from a fellow institution without having to pay any fee. The JLC is led by a Convenor/Secretary and Treasurer.

The JLC has published, among others, directories and handbooks containing information on member institutions, a list of periodical holdings, and a list of dissertations held by member institutions. A four-day workshop on WINISIS was conducted from 20-23 September 2006 to assist future cooperative projects, such as, creating a union catalogue and producing an index to Indian theological Journals in English. Eighty Indian journals have already been selected for this purpose and the task assigned to various institutions.

DIGITALIZATION AND MICROFILMING OF ARCHIVES MATERIALS

We are happy and proud to say that The United Theological College, Bangalore, was awarded the U.S. Ambassador's Cultural Preservation Fund for 2006 on September 27th, 2006 at Chennai. This is the first time that an institution in South India has been awarded this fund. With the help of this fund, we will be digitalizing and microfilming palm leaves, some manuscripts and rare books. We are also very grateful to The United Board for Christian Higher Education in Asia, which has also come forward to sponsor our digitalization and microfilming project. Through the financial help of these two sponsors we will be able to digitalize and microfilm a portion of the Archives material. The project started on 30th October 2006 and will go on for about 8 months.

The United Theological College Archives, which began over 50 years ago, was initiated with the donation of records from the American Madura Mission and the London Missionary Society in Mysore State. It was followed by other missions and churches requesting that their material also be housed here as the Archives is air-conditioned and the material could be well-preserved.

The Archive collection comprises of four types of materials, viz

- 1) Unpublished materials; these are beautifully handwritten records which are vital primary sources.
- 2) Microfilms and microfiches of records, correspondence, petitions etc. of the various mission organizations, including the Census of India from 1872-1951, etc.
- 3) Periodicals, viz Danish-Halle Mission Reports from 1708, Harvest Field from 1861, and others.
- 4) Rare and Old Books, the oldest being Martin Luther's Commentary on Galatians, dated 1523 and some priceless books like Ziegenbalg's First Tamil Bible, Grammatica Damulica (Tamil Grammar) 1716 and many more.

We also have a collection of palm leaves in Kannada, Malayalam, Sanskrit, Tamil and Telugu that are about 200 years old, which contain literature, religious writings, astrological texts etc.

The various private collections of different people, including Vedanayagam Shastriar (Christian poet, Tanjore), Sadhu Sundar Singh (Christian mystic), M.M. Thomas (lay theologian), S.J. Samartha (Inter-religious Dialogue, WCC) etc. are also housed in the archives.

Some of the above materials mentioned are very brittle and in the form of loose sheets, which need our immediate attention in terms of preservation.

The Archives is being used by a host of students, research scholars and teaching faculty from various backgrounds. They include university scholars from various disciplines from India and abroad.

We are hopeful that many more sponsors will come forward to assist us in this noble task, to enable us to complete the digitalizing of the whole archives, so that the material could be made available for wider usage and for the glory of God.

CATALOGUE COMPUTERIZATION : A SIMPLE LIBRARY DATABASE

The Librarian's perspective ...

At the beginning of November we began to input book records into our new Library Database, designed by our Development Officer and based on Microsoft Access. According to our Accessions Registers we have over 23,000 books to enter! We are first inputting the English-language books, as most of our books are in that language, but also to familiarize ourselves with the new system. We have started with the Christianity/comparative religion section (Dewey classes 220-290), and after that we will input sections according to their priority in relation to the subjects that are studied here. When it comes to the Sinhala and Tamil books, we will have to transliterate titles; we have the capability to also input an English title, if given in the book. This will help us to link translated works together.

At the moment, as the Librarian, I am creating the records, again to see if there are any adjustments to be made, but so far I am very happy with the process, and glad that a dream is coming true! We have only two staff in the Library, so at some point we have to make a decision as to whether we hire somebody to input data, being conscious that accuracy of data entry is very important.

If anyone has recent experience of computerizing their catalogue, and has any tips to pass on, we'd be glad to hear from you!

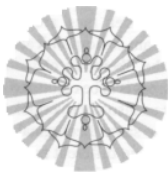
Thoughts from the Development Officer ...

The Theological College of Lanka (TCL) has recently started to load data into a new computer database. This database uses the widely available Microsoft Access tool. The guiding principle behind its development for TCL was the KISS principle, Keep It Simple Stupid, a fundamental design principle in all areas of engineering including software engineering. Version 1 of the database will be used only for searches and does not record borrowing. Given the frequency and length of power cuts and the small number of students, it was felt that making the borrowing function dependent on an electronic database would not be friendly to borrowers and staff. Even so, the database is designed "for but not with" so that borrowings can be easily added in the future. Maintenance of the database by people other than the developer has also been considered. The number of tables has been kept to a minimum while forms, reports and the underlying queries are as uniform as possible. A few macros are used but no Visual Basic (VB) code has been written. The database has been tested with 20,000 test items and will certainly be quick enough for users. Speed and constancy of data entry are helped by the use of publisher, author and corporate body tables which prevent an author, for example, from being entered twice with slightly different spelling. Contributions to a book of collected essays are also entered. A maintenance manual has been produced with long term maintenance in mind.
